Department News

Psychiatry Awards

Undergraduate Awards

There are three undergraduate awards: two for pre-clerkship presenters, and one for clerkship. The Undergraduate committee will be responsible for adjudication processes and provide the Psychiatry Leadership Council with the names of the winners by June 30 of each year.

Postgraduate Awards

There are three postgraduate awards. All department faculty member are eligible from any core or distributed site. Best Clinical Supervisor – in recognition of a faculty member who is recognized for their clinical teaching. Best Clinical Educator – in recognition of a faculty member involved in postgraduate teaching that goes above and beyond clinical teaching including didactic lectures, curriculum development, etc. Should be a combination of both clinical teaching and contribution to didactics, curriculum development, and examinations/assessment.

Best Mentor – in recognition of a faculty member who goes above and beyond as a mentor, role model, and supporter for residents in the Department. Award criteria includes faculty who volunteer their time to support residency education through mentorship, informal supervision, and other ways. Recipients are considered exemplary role models and advocates by the resident body. They sponsor mentees to create networking opportunities, demonstrate sustained commitment and dedication to mentees, as well as compassion, empathy and enthusiasm.

Adjudication for these awards is to be conducted and coordinated across the General Psychiatry Program, and the Child/Adolescent and Geriatric Subspecialty Programs. Whenever possible, residents should vote and provide input on these awards. The residency programs are to provide the Psychiatry Leadership Council with the names of winners by June 30 of each year.

Continuing Professional Development (CPD)

The Continuing Professional Development committee has organized two CPD awards: Best CPD Presentation by a Resident, and Best CPD Presentation by Staff. These awards are to be adjudicated by the CPD lead by June 30 of each year.

Best Resident Teacher

This award recognizes excellence in teaching (both didactic and clinical) for a resident in the Department of Psychiatry. All residents are eligible for this award including the general psychiatry program, and the subspecialty programs. Each year, medical students would be asked to vote on this award. Defer adjudication process to UGE lead.

Research Award

Pending – Dr. MacDougall to discuss and develop.

Department-wide Awards

All Department-wide awards are to be adjudicated by the Psychiatry Leadership Council. Any nominees or nominators will be asked to exclude themselves from adjudication. Nominations for these awards will be open April 1 of each year with a deadline of May 1. A letter of nomination will be requested which specifies how the nominee meets the award criteria. Supporting documentation may be attached if necessary (no more than 5 pages).

Administrative Staff Award

This award recognizes the contribution of administrative staff in the Department. Award criteria includes collegiality, excellence, and professionalism.

Faculty of the Year Award

The Faculty of the Year Award is the flagship award for the Department of Psychiatry. This award recognizes a member of the Department who excels in multiple areas. Award criteria include one or a combination of the following:

- Advocacy (works actively to reduce stigma and promote system improvement)
- Wellness Promotion (role models self-care and work-life integration and supports quality improvement initiatives in support of others' wellness)
- Clinical Innovation (leads or develops innovative clinical programs)

Team Award

This award recognizes exceptional achievement by a team of three or more individuals (faculty and/or staff) who have come together in areas including research, education, administration, innovation, public service, or advocacy. The award recognizes a team that exemplifies:

- Enthusiasm for collaboration and ability to lead change
- Creative interdisciplinary or intraprofessional collaboration
- Innovation (clinical, educational, or research)

Award Eligibility

Any faculty member of the Department who meets criteria is eligible for awards including clinical and basic science faculty. Any award winner would become ineligible for an award for two subsequent award cycles. For example, if someone wins a particular award, he or she would not be eligible to win again until the subsequent third cycle.

PGE Education

UME Education

Summer is drawing to a close and UME is busy preparing for the beginning of another academic year —launching our renewed curriculum for the incoming class and clerks, while delivering the legacy curriculum for years 2 and 4. It is an exciting time with new opportunities and changes in clerkship and pre-clerkship courses.

Clerkship has now launched into CBME and we have successfully transitioned from OWL to Elentra. If you will be supervising year 3 clerks, please note that the attached document contains information about assessing our clerks in the upcoming academic year and explains the transition. There is also a separate information sheet regarding how to access Elentra and how to forward Elentra notification e-mails from UWO e-mail to another address. Also included is the URL to access the three short training videos on Elentra about how to Log In, how to trigger an assessment, and how to access completed assessments. Once you become familiar with logging in and seeing the new forms, completing the assessments will not be much more difficult nor time consuming than the old ones.

- We are also very excited to share that the 16 week Foundations Course starts in September for first year medical students. Thanks to the dedication and commitment by Dr. Aturan Shanmugalingam, who is the Psychiatry lead for this course.
- ★ Key to a competency-based curriculum is the students' ability to track their learning experiences across all years. This occurs in many ways but one important process is "tagging" of sessions, exam questions, IL's, cases, and other contributions to the curriculum. This is a critical part of each session and course. This must be done by the session leads or developers, as they truly know what each session delivers. All faculty members are requested to support this curricular goal by taking time to tag your sessions using the process incorporating a series of drop down menus. This will allow us easy entry of the "tagging" into Elentra. Students, staff and faculty can then easily search for and track learning in the curriculum.
