

4. Course Description and Design

Delivery Mode: In Person

Students will examine the controversial social/ethical parameters that guide bench-to-bedside experimentation and clinical translation with a particular focus on the cell biology associated with human stem cells, cloning, genetic screening, gene editing and animal research. Other modules will present the advanced cell biological principles and the research pathways that lead to new discoveries related to cell senescence and aging, and cancer cell biology. Students will also be trained in effective debating, abstract writing and scientific poster presentations.

Prerequisite(s): Biology 3316A/B or Physiology 3140A (minimum mark of 70%) or Biology 3309 (minimum mark of 75%) Co-requisite(s): none Anti-requisite(s): none

5. Learning Outcomes

Overview of Course: This advanced experimental cell biology course is targeted primarily to advanced cell biology students. This course has three objectives: **a**) to present students with current information and the state of knowledge in specific area(s) of cell biology from the viewpoint of experimental research and discovery, **b**) to teach students research skills on how to review, criticize, write, discuss and present experimental results and **c**) to discuss ethical/societal issues that are rooted in recent advances in cell biology (e.g., stem cells, genetics).

Introduction to the course:

A: Ethics in Cell Biology: (~4 weeks)

- a) Human stem cell biology and cloning
- b) Genetic screening, diagnosis, and editing
- c) Ethical use of animals in research

Research skill = Students will engage in a research debate on an ethical question in medical cell biology. *Students who are absent for their assigned debate will be required to submit a 5-page written paper on a topic to be assigned.

B: Cell biology of aging and senescence: (~4 weeks)

- a) Cell senescence
- b) Telomere attrition and nuclear architecture
- c) Nutrient sensing and autophagy

Research skill = Students will be expected to organize data into effective abstracts for inclusion as part of a research paper

C: Cell Biology of Cancer: (~4 weeks)

- a) Multi-steps to cancer development and progression
- b) Cell surface receptors and signal transduction in cancer
- c) Heterotypic cell interactions and the tumor microenvironment
- d) Cellular approaches to targeted cancer therapy

Research skill = Students will organize research data in the form of a poster and present the poster to the class.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Discuss current issues in medical bioethics
- Understand the underpinning cell biology that leads to ethical debates
- Prepare an informative abstract
- Understand the molecular mechanisms that guide cell behavior and aging
- Communicate research discoveries in the form of a poster

Information about late or missed evaluations:

- Late assessments without accommodation will be subject to a late penalty as assigned by the instructor
- Missed work of less than 10% will be managed at the discretion of the instructor
- An assessment cannot be submitted after it has been returned to the class; [an alternate assessment will be assigned]
- All modules must be completed to pass the course. If a make-up assessment is missed, the student will receive an INC and will need to complete the task the next time the course is offered.

INC (Incomplete Standing): If a student has been approved by the Academic Counselling Office (in consultation with the instructor/department) to complete term work at a later date, an INC will be assigned. Students with INC will have their course load in subsequent terms reduced to allow them to complete outstanding course work. Students may request permission from Academic Counselling to carry a full course load for the term the incomplete course work is scheduled.

SPC (Special examination): If a student has been approved by the Academic Counselling Office to write a Special Examination and the final exam is the only outstanding course component, an SPC will be assigned. If the class has a makeup exam, the student is expected to write the makeup exam. If the class doesn't have a makeup exam or the student misses the makeup exam for reasons approved by the Academic Counselling Office, the student will write the exam the next time the course is offered. Outstanding SPCs will reduce the course load for the term the exam is deferred as outlined in Types of Examinations policy.

13. How to Be Successful in this Class:

Marks WILL NOT be bumped to the next grade or GPA, e.g., a 79 will NOT be bumped up to an 80, an 84 WILL NOT be bumped up to an 85, etc. The mark attained is the mark you achieved, and the mark assigned; requests for mark "bumping" will be denied.
