Description of Rotation:	The Obstetrics & Gynaecology program offers the opportunity for learning in the Delivery Room and in Clinic.

Description of Clinical Duties:	<p>Delivery Room and Triage: When you are in the Delivery Room on the 4th floor it is important to advertise your presence. We do not have Family Medicine residents every day so when you are there you need to inform the charge nurse in the Birthing Centre and nurses in Triage as well as the residents. Try to attach yourself to one of the teams preferably not a team with a PGY-1. They will call you to do things if they know you are available. If you are in the Birthing Centre you will be signing up to follow women in labour and be involved in their deliveries. You can choose to follow OB pts or Family pts. Be sure to check in at least every 2 hrs on your pts. Hopefully you can do some cervical checks and try to imagine you are responsible for the patients and go through the process of making management decisions which you can run by the residents.</p> <p>Emergency: The OB/Gyn resident is the one who is called first to ER and then they delegate someone to assess the patients. This generally occurs when you are on night float. Family Med Residents who have seen patients in ER find this very useful.</p> <p>Clinics: Clinics run Monday to Friday 9am-12pm and 1pm-4pm. You will receive an email on Fridays outlining the schedule for clinics for the coming week from Alisha Ding. Please send your clinic preferences (which clinic you plan to attend each day) to</p>

	<p>Alisha, Dr. Kirby and your Chief as soon as possible. Alisha will send the learner clinic schedule to the clinic assistants and medical secretaries and ensure that there is minimal overlap between clerks and residents in each clinic. If there are no clinics available for a timeslot then you can be in DR/Triage. During your week of night float you will not be available to go to clinic so be sure to take advantage of clinics when they are available to you. They have been well received by your fellow residents.</p>
<p>On-Call Requirements:</p>	<p>The Chief OB resident will schedule your call shift. Usually you would be on night call Sun, Mon, Wed and Thurs and then 24h weekend call day. Speak to the Chief OB resident about when these would occur.</p>
<p>Description of Setting:</p>	<p>Busy, high acuity department in a regional referral centre. Lots of opportunity for procedures.</p>
<p>Objectives/Expectations:</p>	<p>Evaluations:</p> <p>Ensure you have at least 4-5 evaluations completed throughout your rotation. Family Med Residents can access their evaluations via their One45 dashboard and trigger a daily eval titled, Family Medicine Resident Assessment (Clinical, Surgical & On-Call), just follow the prompts. Completed evals will be sent to Dr. Kirby, who will then use these daily assessments to complete your OB rotation ITER.</p>
<p>Level of Residents Accepted:</p>	<p>PGY1,PGY2</p>
<p>Additional Expectations:</p>	<p>You are expected to see everyone you deliver and should also round on post Cesarean patients. This is usually done alongside the Ob/Gyn residents.</p>
