



Pediatrics – Owen Sound
The Grey-Bruce Regional Pediatric service in Owen Sound offers 2 to 8-week opportunities in General Community Pediatrics training for medical students and residents from all six Ontario medical schools.
In addition to general pediatrics trainees can also expect exposure to specific clinical areas including eating disorders, clinical genetics, and fetal alcohol spectrum disorders.
Interested trainees can also participate in Clinical Research by prior arrangement and approval of the Department of Pediatrics or family medicine at their home academic institution.

Trainees will be offered the opportunity to participate in all clinical activities during weekdays and weekend on-call days.  Participation in on-call after 12.00 pm for medical students is optional and negotiable. Residents are expected to be available throughout the call day and night. Trainees are expected to be available to participate in at least one weekend call (Friday to Sunday) and one rounding (MRP/hospitalist) week (Friday to Thursday) during a two- or fourweek rotation.  At the beginning of their rotation, trainees may spend a few days seeing patients jointly with the preceptor but are expected to transition within a reasonable period to seeing patients independently. After doing a history and physical, trainees are expected to work out a differential

	discussion.
	If two or three trainees are rotating at the same time, one trainee will be detailed to round on all patients starting at 8.00 am and, later, discuss the patients' clinical updates with the rest of the team. The rounding trainee will also be expected to see non-acute stable patients referred by emergency room physicians.
	Trainees are expected to do routine rounds independently and review the cases with the preceptor. Trainees are encouraged to page the preceptor at any time in the event of a patient management issue that needs to be discussed and addressed urgently. Complex and acute patients will be seen initially with the preceptor present.
Sample Schedule:	Trainees will be offered the opportunity to participate in all clinical activities during weekdays and weekend on-call days.
	Participation in on-call after 12.00 pm for medical students is optional and negotiable. Residents are expected to be available throughout the call day and night.
	Trainees are expected to be available to participate in at least one weekend call (Friday to Sunday) and one rounding (MRP/hospitalist) week (Friday to Thursday) during a two- or four-week rotation.
On-Call Requirements:	Trainees are expected to be available to participate in at least one weekend call (Friday to Sunday) and one rounding (MRP/hospitalist) week (Friday to Thursday) during a two- or four-week rotation. Trainees are expected to participate in all weekday on-calls up to 9.00 pm for medical students and midnight for residents.
Description of Setting:	Clinical pediatric consultation and continuity clinic services are provided in the settings of a general ambulatory pediatric clinic and a diabetic pediatric clinic. The department also offers emergency room consultation, pediatric in-patient, and level 11b NICU services. Our pediatricians also have

special interest in specific areas including eating disorders, clinical genetics, fetal alcohol spectrum disorders and clinical research.

Trainee vacation time must be planned way in advance to ensure trainee availability during weekends that the preceptor is on call. Assessing and admitting new patients on weekends and subsequently following up on the admitted patients is one of the most valuable experiences for trainees during the rotation.

Planning vacation time also ensures that such away times are coordinated with a preceptor's conference attendance or other absences, and such times as March break and when the clinic might be closed. The clinic is closed for two weeks between July 20 to August 10, and between December 20th to January 5th. Seeing clinic patients over the March break period is optional and is subject to clerical staff availability.

Trainees and their program should avoid applying for a pediatric rotation in Owen Sound in a block that includes these periods especially the December to January and July to August clinic closure periods.

Four rooms with desktop or laptop computers are available to trainees for use when assessing patients. Trainees must obtain necessary training for using the Cerner (hospital) and PSS (clinic) electronic medical record systems. Both systems are accessible in the pediatric clinic.

However, the PSS system is not accessible in the hospital - ER, pediatric inpatient unit and nursery. It is preferred that ALL notes are dictated instead of typing as typed notes on PSS are not accessible on Cerner and vice versa.

Trainees are expected to dictate all notes on all patients they see or participate in seeing. With the oversight of the preceptor, residents are encouraged to write orders, prescriptions and to write referral letters to other specialists. All trainees are encouraged to be assertive and to show initiative.
