| Brief Description of Rotation: | Dr. Bhooma Bhayana, Community FM The Trauma and Violence-Specialized Primary Care Program at St Joseph's Hospital in London opened in October 2025 and is the first-of-its-kind model of care in North America. The program provides trauma and violence-informed, interdisciplinary primary care to individuals who have experienced or are experiencing trauma, such as sexual assault, intimate partner violence, childhood abuse, exploitation, and/or community violence. The clinic was developed to fill a long-standing gap in care for people whose trauma has created barriers to accessing traditional primary care. It integrates trauma and violence-informed principles into every aspect of service delivery: design, environment, policy, and practice. The five physicians who work in the TVSPCP are also the physicians who work in The Regional Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence Treatment Centre (RSADVTC), also at St. Joseph's Hospital. While the focus of your work will be in the TVSPCP, you will be given an opportunity to learn about care in the RSADVTC and, as opportunities arise, attend medical and forensic assessments in cases of acute sexual assault | | | | |

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| | a) Understand the pivotal role of trauma in the common physical and psychiatric conditions seen in primary care b) Recognize signs and symptoms of trauma displayed by trauma survivors in the health care system c) Learn the principles and practices of trauma and violence - specialized care d) Understand the biological basis of trauma e) Understand the neurobiology of trauma and the effect of trauma on the brain, memory and body. f) Understand trauma related responses: fight, flight, freeze and fawn g) Understand the role of attachment dysregulation in the major psychiatric illnesses a family physician sees every day h) Recognize trauma behaviors in our patients: hypervigilance, dissociation, avoidance, etc., and how to respond both when observing these, and when explaining to patients the nature of and reasons for these responses i) Understand common challenges in the interaction between trauma survivors and the medical system (eg., missed appointments, anger, withdrawal, overuse of services, etc) and the impact of this understanding on lessening clinician frustration and the revictimization of the patient. j) Learn to teach patients grounding and regulation strategies k) Learn to perform a safety assessment and plan l) Understand common pharmacotherapy useful with trauma survivors m) Understand when to refer to psychiatry n) Understand the role of hospital and community teams in interdisciplinary care of trauma survivors o) Understand treatment modalities offered by trauma therapists | | | |
