COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Journal club seminar series provide a forum through which Pathology trainees keep abreast of new developments in basic biomedical research and engage in informal scientific discussion. In addition, it provides students experience in reading, interpreting, evaluating and presenting various biomedical topics taken directly from the primary literature. It is also meant to foster interactions and learn about research taking place in the department.

This course series is required for all MSc (PATHOL 9510, 9511), MSc to PhD transfer (PATHOL 9510, 9511, 9612, 9613), direct-entry PhD (PATHOL 9610, 9611, 9612, 9613), and direct-entry MD/PhD students (PATHOL 9610, 9611, 9612) in the Research-based Graduate Program of Pathology and Laboratory Medicine. This course will emphasize critical review of the literature and provide students with opportunities to improve their presentation skills and ability to critique scientific research.

All students will present one published research article during the Fall term (September – December) and their own research projects in the Winter term (January – April), for each course in the series.

4.	To allow students to have scientific interactions with each other		


COURSE MATERIAL/RESOURCES:
