
## PHYS/PHARM 3000E LABS

The organization recognizes top undergraduate work, shares it globally and creates a network for students across disciplines.

In 2025, one of the students in our lab course was recognized for the long report that they submitted as part of Rotation 3. Shayan Rakhshan received the 2025 Highly Commended award in the Medical Sciences discipline for their long report, titled "Investigating the Combined Impact of Corticosteroids and PI3K Inhibitors on Bone Growth and Development in Murine Models". Shayan did exceptional on the report and in the course. This experiment was supervised by Dr. Matt Grol, with teaching assistants Hayley Murray (Grol lab) and Jesutofunmi Adesuyi (McGuire lab). 
