Graduate Studies Update

Welcome to new and continuing Graduate Students to the new Academic Year!

New this year for Graduate Students: The Physiology and Pharmacology Seminar Committee has put together an exciting line-up of speakers for this upcoming year. Although the Physiology and Pharmacology Graduate Student Handbook states that graduate students "are required to attend Department Seminars during each academic year for the duration of their residency period", a mechanism has not been in place to implement this requirement. After consultation with the Department Executive Committee as well as Graduate Students and Graduate Student Council representatives, the following will be introduced.

Graduate students (including those in collaborative specializations) will be expected to attend at least 70% of Departmental seminars in person (weekly seminars, special seminars, Department Research Day, PhD public lectures, etc.).

Attendance will be monitored using sign-up sheets located in the seminar room, and the remote seminar viewing room for those faculty and students located at the south end of the city. Students who work at the Victoria campus can attend on the main campus or the seminar room at the south end (room locations to be included on the seminar poster).

A general Zoom link for the seminar will no longer be offered but can be provided upon request for special circumstances by contacting Jane lacob.

At the end of these talks, graduate students will be given priority to ask questions. We encourage all Graduate Students to attend and actively participate in these events to round out their professional education.

The Seminar Committee has also reached out to all faculty members to ask them to likewise prioritize their attendance in order to set a positive example, increase department interactions, and engage with visiting speakers.

Please also plan to attend our <u>New Graduate Student Orientation</u> on <u>Thurs, Sept 18</u> from 11:30-12:30 in MSB 212 A/B. This session will provide important information about your program. Pizza and drinks will be provided.



The 2025 Gowdey Distinguished Lecture and Research Day will take place on Tuesday, November 4th, 2025. We are delighted to welcome Dr. Hans Clevers as this year's distinguished lecturer. Dr. Clevers is a Distinguished University Professor of Molecular Genetics at Utrecht University, Netherlands. He is internationally recognized for his groundbreaking work developing and applying organoids to study the molecular mechanisms of tissue and cancer development.
