An update from the "real" Chair...

If you have enjoyed my silence over the last few months, I am sorry to disrupt it briefly. But I wanted to provide an update on my health.

As you might recall, I have been diagnosed with a rare cancer called Adenoid Cystic Carcinoma. Most recently, I have been on chemotherapy for lung metastasis from the primary tumour. Recent scans have made it clear that this chemotherapy is no longer working and the metastasis have started to grow again. Therefore, I will take a short holiday from chemo and start a different regimen in March. Based on the schedule and available information, I do not expect that these treatments will have an impact on my ability to chair the department starting July 1.

This is a slow growing cancer and I remain optimistic that we will get a handle on it. Any questions or concerns, please let me know.

## **Undergraduate Studies Update**

Our semester is over half-way done and we are looking ahead to our final exam period. Please note that students now have access to the final exam schedule and can see the date assigned to your class by the registrar. We will be hosting a common makeup exam date in early May. Once approved, this information will be shared with all course managers.

Course managers should have received an email from WTS with regards to the new learning management system (LMS), **Brightspace**, which will replace OWL beginning in May. In this email (February 9<sup>th</sup>), you would have been invited to request a sandbox for you to navigate to start learning the new LMS. The ability to make that request is still live in the Qualtrics link that was provided in that email, so please respond to that survey link to have early access to Brightspace.

For anyone who teaches in any capacity, learning the new LMS is an essential part of your professional development this summer. Please make it a high priority to attend any workshops related to learning Brightspace as it navigates differently than OWL. Getting used to it now will make your teaching in the fall/winter terms more successful. The system is user friendly, but since it is different than OWL, there will be a learning curve. There will be some aspects of course delivery and evaluations that you will need to modify as some of the tools in OWL are not available in Brightspace. Our teaching faculty will be available for consultation later in the summer, but the primary learning needs to happen with you attending user workshops that are being created centrally for this purpose.

Academic Excellence – University academic transcripts demonstrating high academic talent supported by a record of merit-based scholarships and/or awards.

#### X-LABS Reminder:

Last year, Schulich started a new outreach program called "X-LABS" (eXperiential Learning Academy in Biomedical Sciences). X-LABS identifies talented, committed high school students with interest in biomedical sciences that would benefit from enrichment experiences at SSMD. The program specifically focuses on students from low socioeconomic status environments that would otherwise have extreme difficulty capitalizing on opportunities to expand their skills and talents.

X-LABS 2023 was strongly supported by the Dean's Office and included all Basic Science Departments. The highlight of the program was a two-week immersive experience in research laboratories/programs at SSMD in mid-July. This was enormously well received by the students, their families, the participating labs and our partners in the Thames Valley and Avon Maitland District School Boards.

X-LABS 2024 is back again this year, with some expansion. The previous cohort of 10 students will be invited back for "year 2" (they will now have completed 11th grade) and a new cohort of students will be invited that will have just completed the 10th grade. As such, we need to increase the number of research/laboratory opportunities.
