

THANK YOU FROM DR. BIRCEANU

Rotation 3 of the 3rd year Physiology and Pharmacology laboratory course (PP3000E) concluded right before the spring reading week. I would like to take this opportunity to recognize the faculty who have participated and led innovative experiments for our students.

Drs. Adrian Owen and Taylor Schmitz took on the neuroscience challenge of the lab, by designing big-data experiments, challenging the students to explore novel questions in the realm of human emotion, brain function and muscle movement. Dr. Peter Stathopoulos introduced the students to the wonderful world of drug design, using bioinformatics approaches. While hesitant to sign up for this experiment at first, the students informally let me know that they have learned so much from Dr. Stathopoulos and were now able to integrate what they learned from the cell physiology course into a real-world application. Dr. Chris Pin led a cell-culture experiment that introduced the students to cellular stress and PCR, supporting their understanding of cell culture, experimental design and introducing them to novel techniques, such as cell collection and gel loading. Drs. Sean Gill and Ruud Veldhuizen led our spirometry experiment this rotation, challenging the students to think outside the box when designing an exercise experiment. They were firmly rooted in the “exercise corner” of the laboratory space. Last, but not least, Dr. Matt Grol led his first ever experiment in our laboratory course (woohoo!!), where he introduced students to factors that impact bone growth.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to the Grol, Beier and Séguin trainees who helped with the dissections, making our undergraduate student experience in the course that much more meaningful. We, in the lab course, see you and appreciate you all!


Graduate Studies Update




EDID Committee Update

On March 3rd, the Department of Physiology and Pharmacology, in collaboration with BrainsCAN, hosted the honorable Dr. Kirsty Duncan on our campus. This event was part of our Department Seminar Series, and focused on Equity, Diversity, Inclusion and Decolonization (EDID) topics.



The event was hosted by Dr. Lisa Saksida. Following the format of a fireside talk, Drs. Saksida and Duncan engaged in discussions focused on the challenges faced by women and equity deserving groups in academia. Drawing from her own personal, professional, and political experiences, Dr. Duncan discussed what academic departments and leaders can do to create an inclusive and supportive environment for colleagues and trainees. Re-assessing the definition of excellence in academia through a more comprehensive lens other than the traditional paper and grant metrics was one of the main take-aways. Science advocacy and support for EDID initiatives were two topics that were at the heart of the conversation.



Health and Safety Committee Update

This month we would like to review best practises for dispensing and working with liquid nitrogen. This cold fluid can burn you but it will also damage floors, sinks and counter tops if not used properly. Always wear the proper PPE including gloves that protect against the cold and a face shield when dispensing liquid nitrogen. Always use a receptacle that is made to contain liquid nitrogen. When removing racks and boxes from a cryo-tank, let the liquid nitrogen drain into the tank before setting the rack down. Place the rack on a protective surface. Never discard liquid nitrogen by pouring it out onto the floor or down a sink, allow it to evaporate in a fume hood.
