





PEPP Updates

Funding: Our research group has been successful as a co-applicant in 2 CIHR awards, announced this month. The first, led by Dr. Kelly Anderson in collaboration with PEPP research led by Dr. Palaniyappan, will explore the effects of cannabis legalization on the incidence of psychosis in Ontario. The second, led by Dr. Archie of McMaster, in collaboration with PEPP research led by Dr. Palaniyappan, will study a gaming intervention to reduce cannabis use among Black and minority youth with psychosis.

One paper worth highlighting for our faculty is the work led by Dr. Dempster when she was a PGY-5 resident with PEPP, based on a 5-yr follow-up of the PEPP cohort assembled by Dr. Ross Norman and colleagues. In this paper, we observe that the use of a simple measurement of total symptom burden at baseline and 6 months, along with an assessment of treatment compliance, may help us increase the use of clozapine early in psychosis. Training: Peter van Dyken, MD/Ph.D. student in our research group has been selected to submit a full application for the PSI Research Trainee Award.

DISCOURSE stands for Diverse International Scientific Consortium for Research in Thought, Language and Communication in Psychosis. Developmental Disabilities Program Update

The Developmental Disabilities Program is thrilled to welcome our first-ever Clinical Fellow in Developmental Disabilities.

The Faculty and staff in the Developmental Disabilities Program have been working tirelessly for several years to create and implement a Clinical Fellowship in Developmental Disabilities in the Department of Psychiatry.

This project, which to our knowledge, is the first Clinical Fellowship specific to Developmental Disabilities in a Psychiatry program that is externally funded in Canada. We are extremely proud of this project and are grateful to Shannon Bain, the Director of the Child and Parent Resource Institute in London, and the Government of Ontario Ministry of Children, Community, and Social Services for their support.

PGE Update

The PGY1 cohort from last year successfully completed the first-year rotations in a CBD model and feedback was generally positive about having more direct supervision. We are working on streamlining the process of sending EPAs and having them completed.

We have launched CBD for the PGY2s and the PGY3s are also having a pilot of CBD EPAs this year.

A CBD Handbook was launched to provide information to residents and consultants about how CBD works and details of CBD for different years and different rotations.
